### **Innovative Programs and Career Technical Education (CTE) classes**




- A program of study that involves a multiyear sequence of courses that integrates core academic knowledge with technical and occupational knowledge to provide students with a pathway to postsecondary education and careers. (CDE)




#### Work Permit <u>required\*</u>: Camp counselors, Lifeguarding, Tutoring

- Pet services
- Babysitting
- Tutoring

Unpaid experiences not included in labor laws, although some companies request a B-4 (process through Ms. Kaci)

You are welcomed to explore the following information which begins with testimonial slides from a former PAUSD CAC parent followed by additional resources.





- 1. Give some thought to your child's strengths AND challenges
  - a. Social skills & Executive function skills
  - b. Independence level
    - How much supervision will they need at job
    - Getting to and from work
  - c. Motivation internally motivated or will you need to help motivate them?
  - d. What do they want to do? Their goals beyond electronics (HAHA)
  - e. What is the right amount of time for them to work
    - An hour or two? How many times a week? Part-time? After school? During school- the cafe/smoothie joint was great
  - f. Anxiety levels & self regulation
  - g. Decision making skills
  - h. Taking responsibility for actions
  - i. Ability to take correction/criticism





How much work will their job require of you as a parent

- Driving to and from
- Helping find job
- Dress codes
- Behavior changes- what is and is not acceptable behavior
- Keeping job
- For a paying job you do not advocate for them- hands off
- Sitting with them and supporting them for more "volunteer jobs"
- Controlling access to electronics- Big one for Nick and ultimately why he was fired from TJs





3. *Hidden rules* of work place (training programs might go over these but it needs to be more explicit & reinforced at home)

- "Who" is their Boss
  - a. How do you show respect?
  - b. How and when do you express concerns , advocate for help etc
- Behavior expectations
- Performance reviews
- Keeping track of breaks and keeping busy
- Being helpful and trying new things





Finding a job

- Friends- reach out to friends with businesses and ask for opportunity
- Programs for SPED students
- Apply to want ads- online (depending on age)
- Volunteer opportunities you can do together or solo
- Ask to create a "job" like a greeter, dog walker with your assistance or help stuff envelopes for business mailings
- Job around house chores, pay X bill, call to order dinners, etc.
- Look for SPED friendly organizations/businesses





What if it doesn't work out? Even after high school:

- Trying again, what didn't work, what did? (post mortem)
- What kind of placement would be better?
- What do they need to be successful?
- Try, and try again...
- Build a tribe do you have a community to lean on?





Upon graduation set expectations with your child:

- Get job even if part time
- Pay rent even if below market rate if they still live at home

NOW is the time to introduce concepts and support of work/career/holding a job, which is why mentoring, neighborhood tasks, pet sitting, etc. are all ways to give a child recognition and start to build their career portfolio.





#### Social Skills Program Using PEERS: Aprils in Monday via Zoom



PEERS® for Adolescents is a 14-week evidence-based social skills program for motivated teens in middle and high school who want to learn new ways of making and keeping friends Teen sessions include explicit teaching of social skills and opportunities to practice. Parents attend separate sessions at the same time and are taught how to support their teen in expanding their social network and handling various social situations. Parent participation is required. PEERS® may be appropriate for teens with Autism Spectrum Disorder, ADHD, Anxiety, Depression or other social and behavioral disorders.
